

Want to be a Petsitter?

You can earn £50 - £300+ per week depending upon the services you offer. The three main services are: petsitting in your home (if suitable), petsitting in the owners home, and daycare and dog walking. There are various other associated services, such as delivery/collection, grooming, training etc. You can choose to "sit" on occasional weekends, or make it a full time occupation with many regular clients.

Pet sitters list their services and experience and once registered; your profile is not only listed on the site but emailed to all pet owners who have requested Email Notification of new pet sitters in their area.
